


World Science Day for Peace and Development is an International day that highlights the important role that science has in society and is celebrated each year on November 10th.








We are proud to present our young artists and styling artists who overwhelmed us with their technical knowledge when presenting their skills for:

Gateway The Complete School, Sholinganallur, encouraged students to pen down their creativity and expression through celebrating Journalism Day.







The kids enjoyed visiting various animals and exploring their environment. They learnt more exciting information about various animals. They also learnt to move past their fears and trepidation about certain animals, reptiles and bugs. Visiting a zoo allows for exploration and discovery while sparking curiosity and creativity. They were engaged in a fun at home learning activity by making a model of the Zoo and took us on a tour to their zoo which involved themselves in role-play, creativity and helped to improve their vocabulary and confidence.





As a part of their research for Global perspectives students of grade 5 interviewed their relatives and friends on the topic "Sharing the Planet".

Central Idea for the inquiry was: Humans make food choices that have an impact on other living beings.

Concepts: Responsibility, causation, connection

Lines of Inquiry:

- 1. Where does food come from?
- 2. Factory farming vs. sustainable farming.
- 3. Impact of our food choices.

1) Where our food comes from?

Participant 1 (Mom):

Our food comes from plants. Even animals that have been killed for meat have eaten plants, or have eaten animals that have eaten plants. Our food comes from lots of different plant parts. These parts were essential to the plants when they were alive.

Participant 2 (Dad):

The food chain starts with a primary energy source, usually the sun. The second part of the chain are the producers, which are organisms that make their own food from the primary energy source (e.g. plants). Plants are producers as they use the photosynthesis process to make their own food.

Participant 3 (Uncle):

The food we eat feeds our microbes, gives us energy and nutrition, and keeps us healthy. The choices we make about our food clearly affects our health, but also has a huge effect on the world around us. We need to make more effort to choose correctly.

2)Factory farming v/s Sustainable farming?

Participant 1 (Mom):

The foods that come from sustainable farms use a sparse amount of pesticides, hormones, antibiotics or even petroleum-based fertilizers.

What does this mean for our health?

It is all good as this sustainable methodology enables people to better health outcomes and the prevention of many chronic diseases that are largely preventable.

Participant 2 (Dad):

Industrial farming: Industrial crops contain more nitrates and are often heavily sprayed with pesticides.

Sustainable farming: Food is grown with minimal or no use of pesticides or other dangerous chemicals. It can be healthier and more nutritious than industrially-raised food.

Participant 3 (Uncle):

Industrialized agriculture is highly concentrated and mechanized, relying on chemical inputs like fertilizers, pesticides and non-therapeutic antibiotics. However, sustainable agriculture, which uses methods that protect the environment, public health, human communities and animal welfare, is gaining traction.

3) Impact of our food choices

Participant 1 (Mom):


What we eat matters. The food choices we make every day have a big effect on the environment. The good news is that even small changes in what we buy and eat can add up to real environmental benefits, including fewer toxic chemicals, reduced global warming emissions, and preservation of our ocean resources.






